# Ethics Commission Mission

To promote the highest standards of ethical conduct in City government and to ensure transparency into campaign finance and lobbying activities.

# Advances in FY26

Commission staff have researched, adopted, and tracked **30 new Key Performance Indicators (KPIs)** to drive efficient, accurate results

- Through May, staff **opened 140 investigations**, with cases spending a rolling average of 1.36 months in the preliminary review phase
- Staff resolved **over 95% of cases within one year**
- Auditors completed 27 campaign committee audits, reviewing **an average of 261 transactions per auditor** for each completed audit
- Auditors also processed and reviewed **over 3,600 submitted contributions** through the Commission's public financing program, distributing over \$1.5 million

- The Commission's disclosure and compliance teams resolved **over 2,500 support tickets**, providing advice, guidance, and technical support
- Commission staff and systems processed **over 12,000 filings** across program areas
- Staff partnered with the Office of the Mayor to strengthen and streamline its Form 700 filing program, **resulting in over 98% compliance** as of June 2026

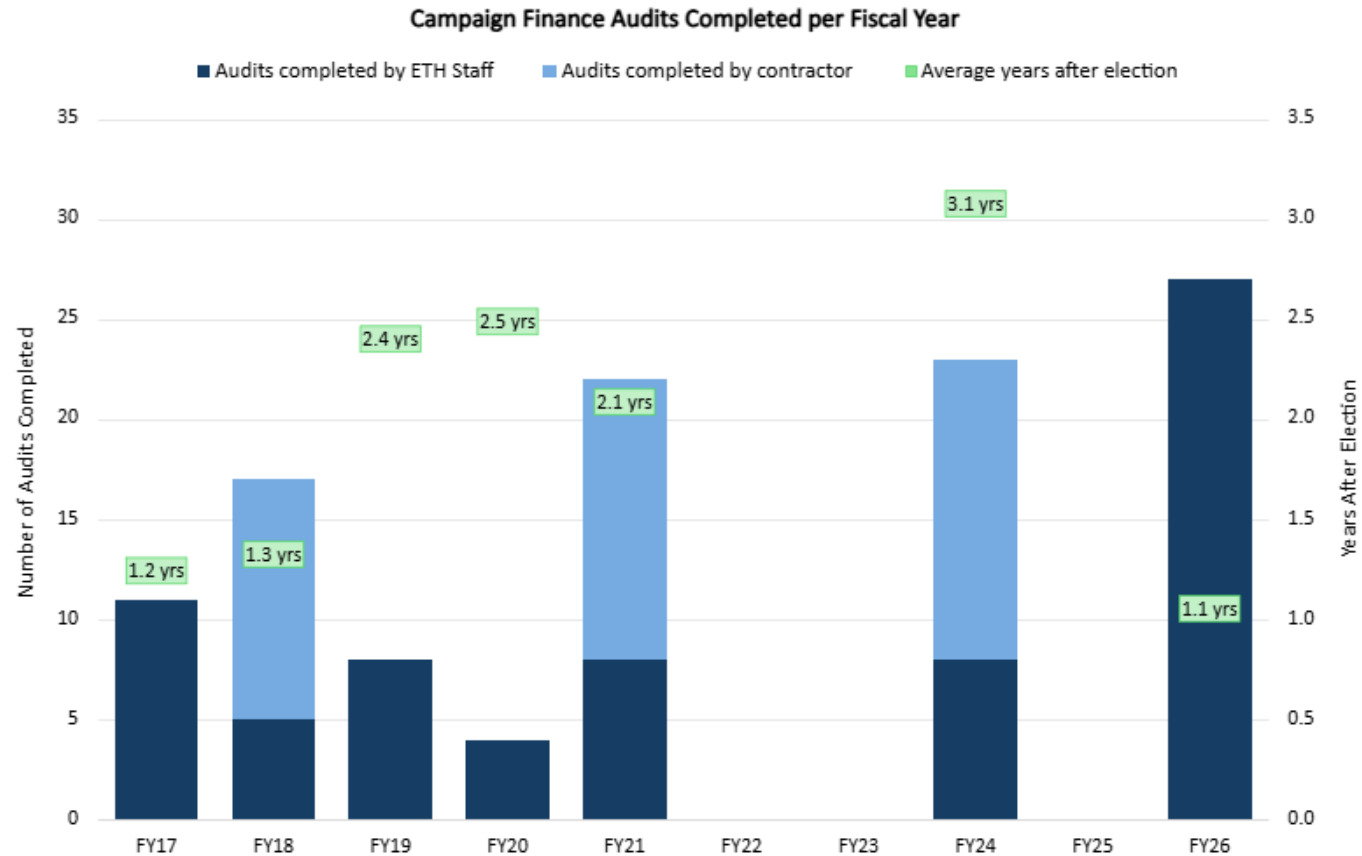

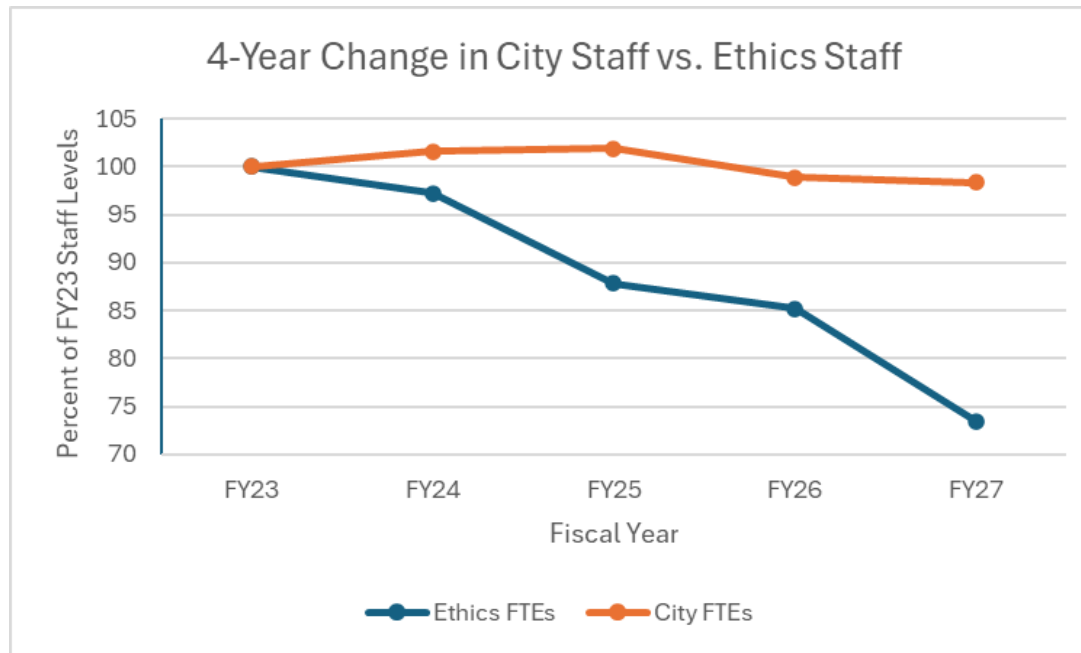
# Commission's Funding Snapshot

The department has attempted during FY26 to wind down under-used programs in response to cuts in last year's budget.

# FY27 Budget Impact Snapshot



- **Government Ethics:** With a largely unchanged workforce, City employees need continued service through trainings, advice, guidance, and technical assistance.
- **Money in Politics:** Committees spent \$69.9 million in November 2024 City elections, and have already spent \$17.9 million in the 2026 City elections. A fully staffed Ethics Commission is required to provide training and advice to campaigns; administer the public financing program; and hold campaigns accountable for improper activity.

# Budget Impact

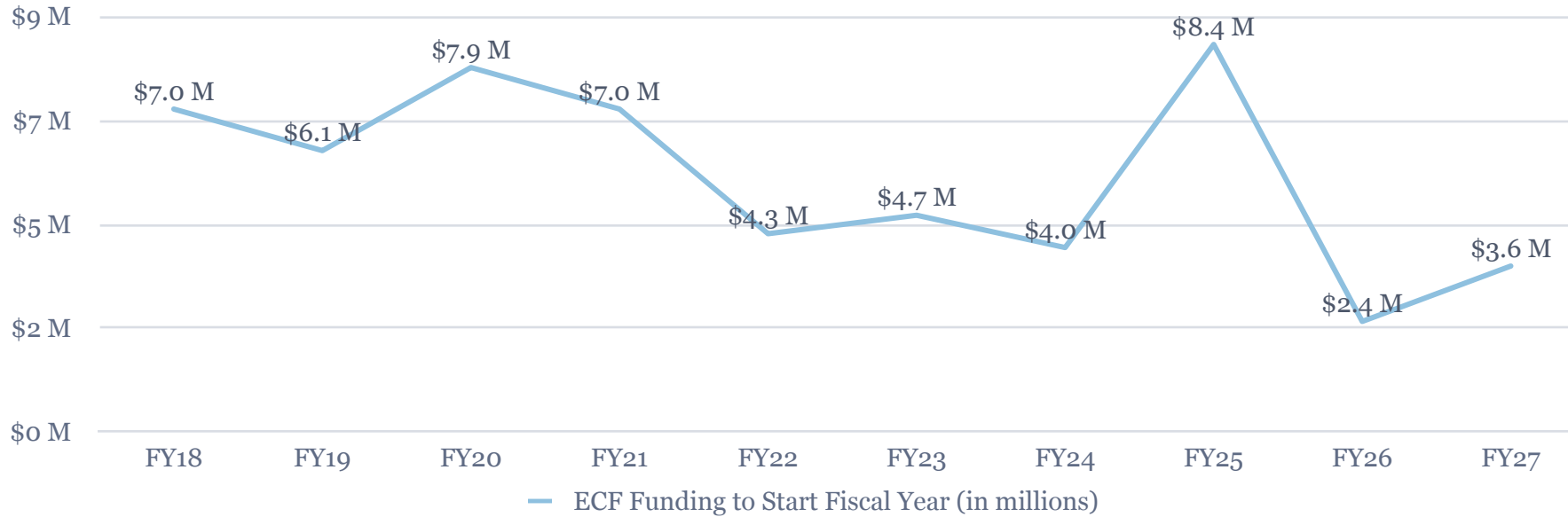
**Mayor's Proposed Budget:** Eliminates 25% of funded positions in Engagement & Compliance and 25% of funded positions in Operations. These cuts would require a reduction in ETH services:

- A rollback of **direct compliance services**, including in-person trainings, tailored departmental support, and proactive Form 700 program that led to over 99% compliance
- **Longer response times and fewer resources** for individuals seeking advice, guidance, and technical assistance
- Inability to address **ongoing campaign malfeasance or risks to government ethics**, including the May 2026 BLA recommendations for Chapter 6 departments and public works contractors

# Election Campaign Fund

- Funds public financing for candidates for Mayor and the Board of Supervisors
- Mayor's Budget Proposal adds \$2,974,897 to Election Campaign Fund
- Carryover funds covers disbursements, system maintenance, and administrative costs

ECF Funding to Start Fiscal Year



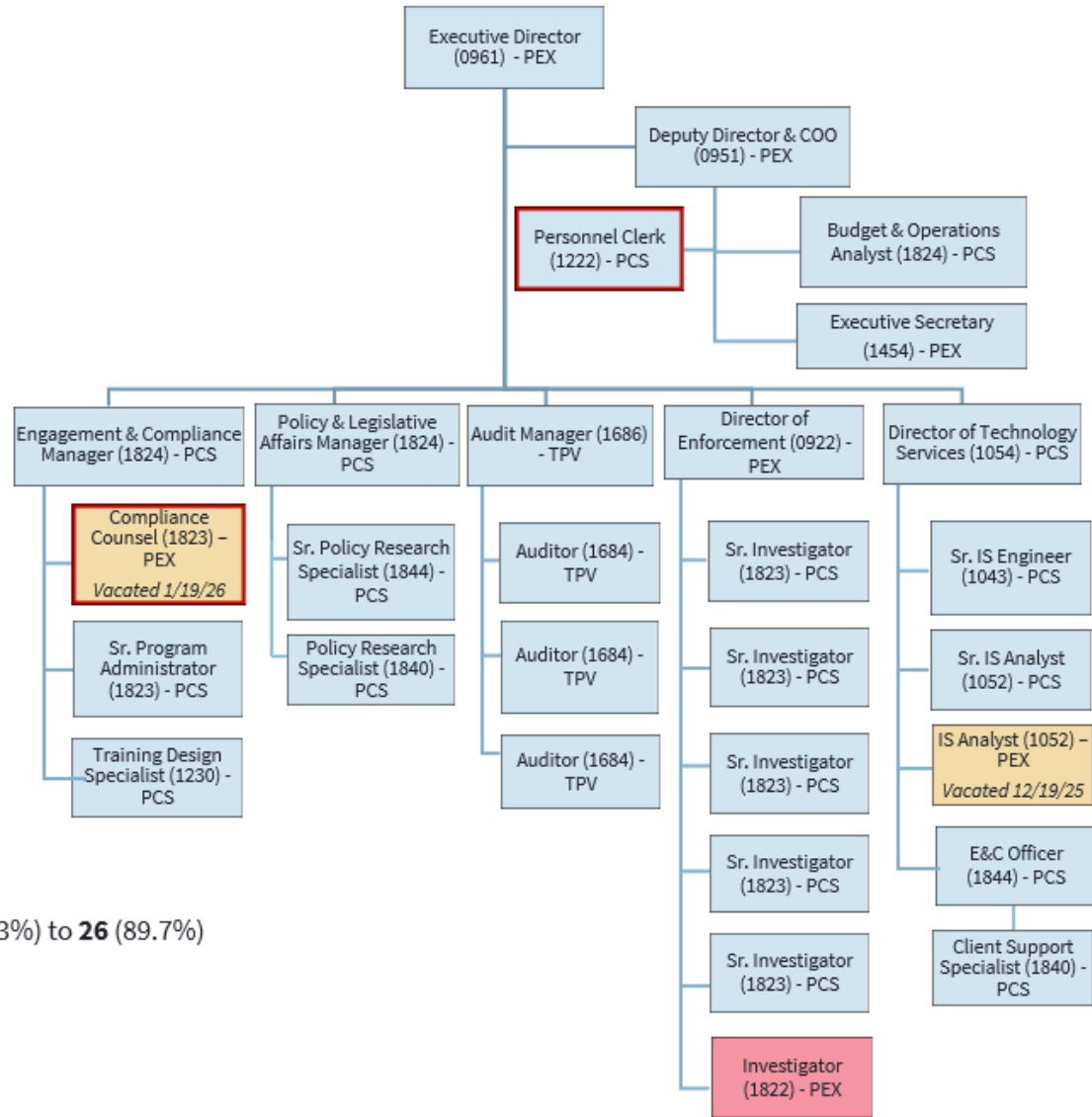
# Commission Requests

## **Restore One Vacant 1823 Position (Compliance Assistance)**

- Restore an 1823 position that would otherwise be eliminated in the proposed budget.
- Requires restoring one FTE (1823) to the ASO.

- Ratio of Managerial to Non-Managerial **3 (10.3%) to 26 (89.7%)**



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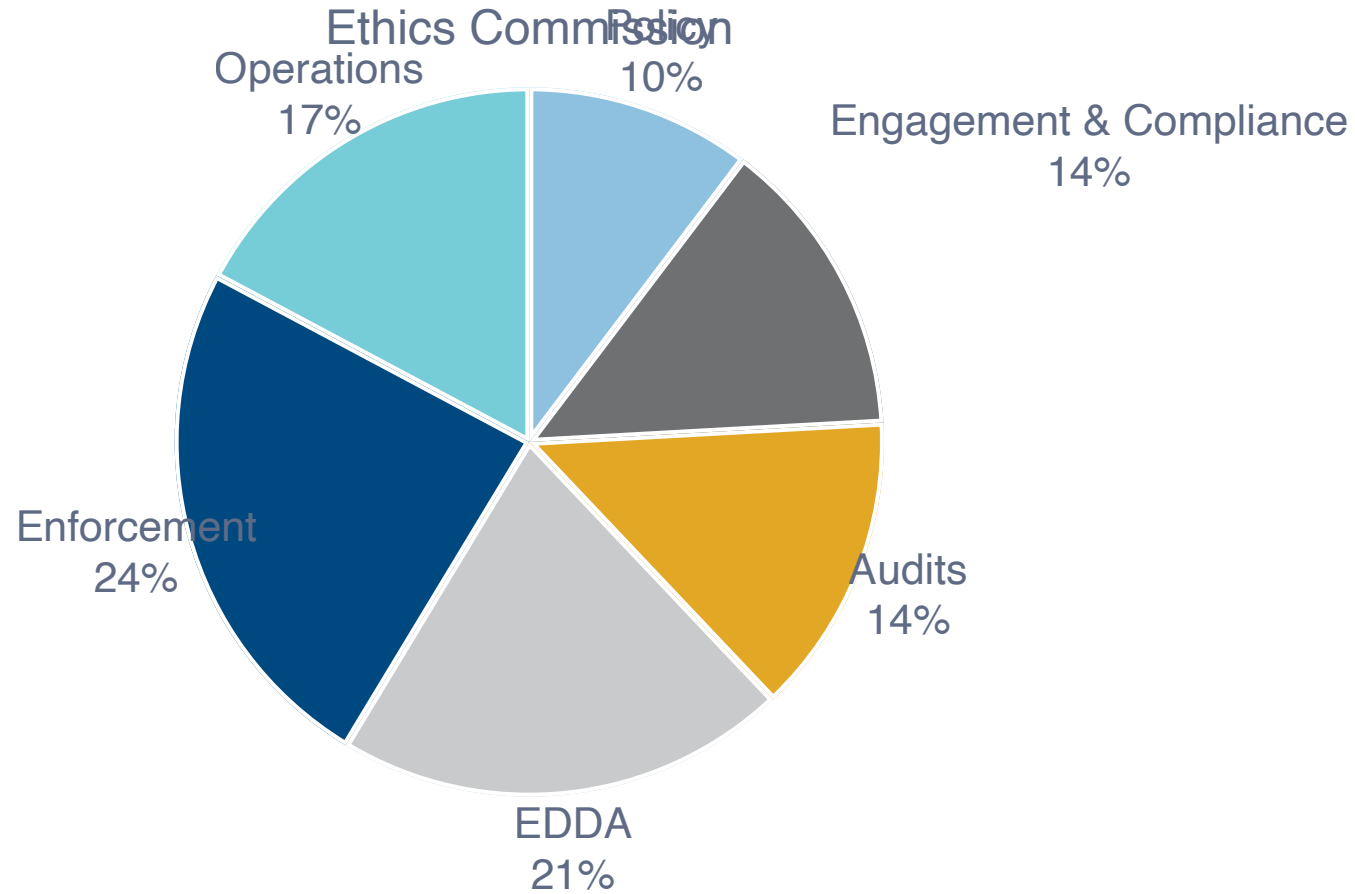
